FROM MAYOR RICK CREECY

The City of Keiser continues to make steady progress on several major projects that will strengthen our community for years to come. Our city engineer has completed all design work for the upcoming Sewer Restoration Project, and the full plans and specifications have been submitted to the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission (ANRC) for approval. This project includes replacing every sewer line in town using a modern technology called Pipe Bursting. With this method, crews will dig a hole at one manhole and another at the next manhole. A cable is then fed through the old pipe and attached to a new continuous sewer line. Hydraulics pull the new pipe through the old line, effectively replacing it without having to dig up the entire street. After the new line is installed, all manholes will be reworked and sealed to stop groundwater from entering the system, and any customer connections will be tied back into the new line. In addition, the Poplar and Jefferson lift stations will be fully replaced with brand-new units. Once ANRC approves the plans, the project will be advertised in the newspaper, contractors will review the design work, and sealed bids will be submitted. After the bid opening, a contractor will be selected, and work is expected to begin early next year, weather permitting.

Design work is also underway to fix

the long-standing drainage issues in the Circle. When the engineering plans are finished, the City will meet with all affected residents to review the design, answer questions, and discuss the construction timeline. This project is also expected to begin early next year.

At the city park, great progress has been made on the new Bike/Walking Trail. Contractors have removed roughly 10 inches of soil along the entire path, leveled it to grade, and added compacted gravel to create a solid base for the asphalt. We now need a stretch of warmer, dry weather to complete the paving before winter. If conditions do not improve soon, paving will take place in the spring.

We are excited about the improvements taking shape across Keiser. These projects reflect our commitment to strengthening infrastructure, improving safety, and enhancing quality of life for all residents. And we are not done yet—more updates and new projects will be announced soon.

Being a Backup for Someone on the Job: More Than Just Filling In

Being a backup for someone on the job is often underestimated. It's a role that requires flexibility, awareness, and a willingness to step into someone else's workflow with confidence. The City of Keiser recently faced an unexpected challenge when the Lift Station on Jefferson experienced a significant breakdown. This particular lift station is an important part of our sewer system, serving roughly **15% of the town**, so any disruption required immediate attention. The issue first came to light when a resident noticed a backup in the sewer lines. Upon inspection, it was determined that the pump inside the lift station was losing its prime and failing to pump properly.

Our city crew immediately disassembled the pump, cleaned it thoroughly, adjusted it to the required clearance, and installed new gaskets. This emergency repair allowed the system to operate at about **25% flow capacity**, just enough to keep things moving while we waited for a technician from the Arkansas Rural Water Association. When the technician arrived, he confirmed that several internal components of the pump needed to be replaced. The necessary parts were ordered, and within a week they were installed.

During the repair process, crews also discovered that

the reduced flow had allowed debris to build up inside the check valve. The valve was disassembled, cleaned, and reassembled. Unfortunately, the debris included items such as **mop strings, dental floss, and feminine products**—materials that **should NEVER be flushed down any toilet**. These items easily clog pumps, damage equipment, and create costly repairs for the entire community.

Thanks to the diligent work of our city employees and the assistance from Arkansas Rural Water, the lift station is now fully restored and operating at **100% capacity**. Our city workers did an **OUTSTANDING** job responding quickly, working long hours, and showing true dedication to keeping our sewer system functioning. I am extremely proud of their efforts.

The good news is that this lift station is already scheduled for **full replacement in 2026** as part of our long-term sewer improvement plan, which will make the system more reliable and reduce issues like this in the future.

Elimination of the One Cent Penny

The U.S. Government has officially announced the elimination of the one-cent penny, and the City of Keiser is taking proactive steps to ensure this change has minimal impact on our residents. While the transition may feel unusual at first, most customers will experience no change at all. Anyone paying their utility bill by **check, credit card, debit card, or through the online payment portal** will see absolutely no difference—your payment will continue to post in exact amounts, just as it always has.

The only adjustment will apply to **cash payments** when the customer does not have exact change. Because pennies will no longer be used, cash transactions must now be rounded to the nearest nickel. For example, if your bill is **\$71.62**, you will have two simple options:

- You may pay **\$71.65**, giving you a **3-cent credit**

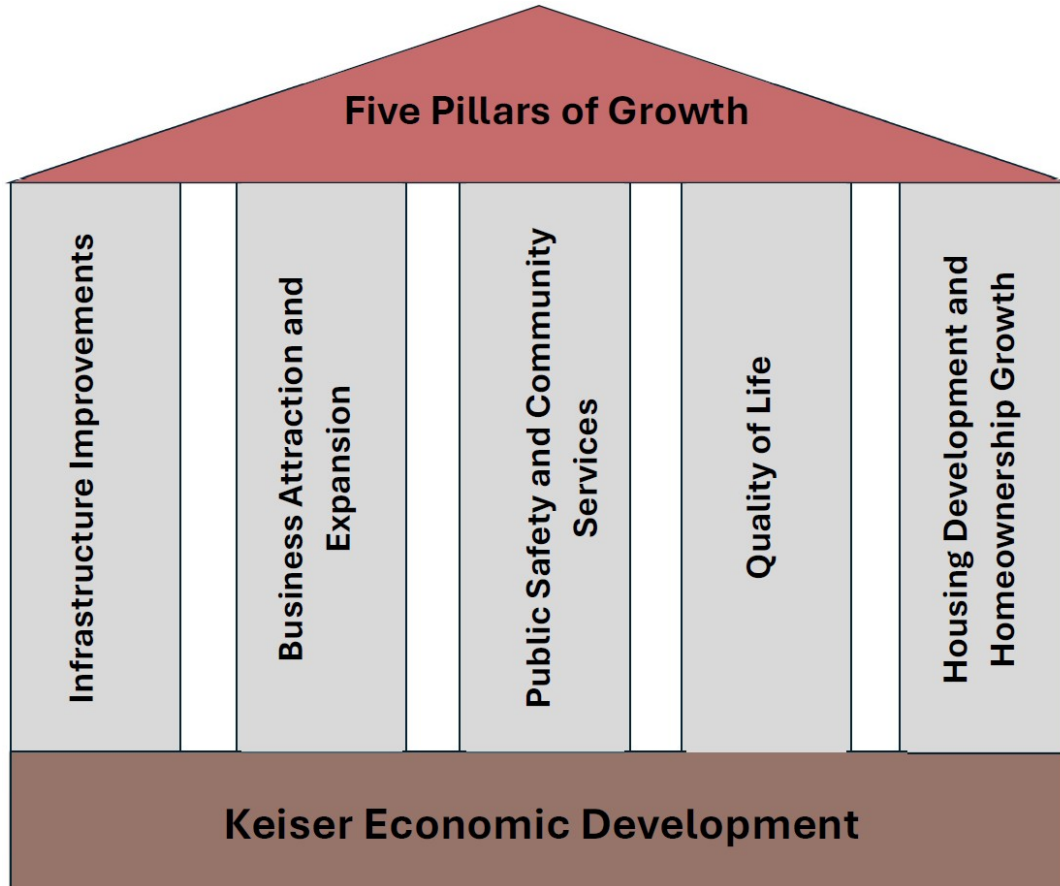
on your account; or

- You may pay **\$71.60**, and the **remaining 2-cent balance** will carry over to the next month.

To make this transition fair and worry-free, the City will update the new water billing software so that **no late fees will ever be charged on balances of four cents or less**. This ensures that any small rounding difference from the absence of pennies will not penalize our customers or cause unnecessary frustration.

As always, our goal is to keep our billing process transparent, accessible, and convenient. The City of Keiser will continue to monitor federal guidance and make any additional adjustments needed to help our residents adapt smoothly to the penny's retirement.

DOJ Community Policing Grant

The City of Keiser is proud that we have been awarded a \$25,000 Community Policing Grant to expand and strengthen our community safety initiatives. This funding supports a well-designed series of programs that work hand-in-hand with our residents to build a safer, more connected community.

A key focus of the grant is the expansion of our Neighborhood Watch Program. With new captains, improved neighborhood signage, enhanced text-alert systems, and hands-on training academies, this effort will boost community vigilance and strengthen our partnership between residents and law enforcement. By empowering neighbors to look out for one another, we create a stronger, more united community.

The grant also supports a variety of community outreach events. These gatherings allow our officers to meet residents where they are—whether at local festivals, public meetings, or city events. Through booth setups, printed materials, refreshments, and extended officer availability, these events help build trust, encourage open communication, and make it easier for everyone to work together for a safer Keiser.

Drug prevention and education is another major component. With an emphasis on combatting drug misuse—including opioid abuse—this effort will provide educational workshops, printed materials, and public service announcements designed to equip families with knowledge and resources. Officers will also participate in prevention programming to reach more residents and strengthen community awareness.

To encourage citizen involvement, the grant includes new community feedback tools, such as an online survey platform, accessible suggestion boxes, and improvements to the Police Department's website. These additions will give residents multiple ways to share ideas, raise concerns, and stay informed about local safety efforts.

Public safety education campaigns will also play an important role. Through seasonal flyers, emergency

preparedness information, and hands-on safety workshops, residents will receive timely guidance on how to stay safe throughout the year—whether during storms, holidays, or community events.

Traffic safety is another priority for Keiser. With new tools like a traffic flow analyzer, updated signage, enforcement resources, and incentive programs, the city will be able to better monitor roadways, improve traffic management, and reduce incidences on our streets.

Emergency response preparedness will also be strengthened. Additional equipment, improved communication tools, and planned emergency drills will help ensure that our teams are ready to respond quickly and effectively during real emergencies.

The grant further supports Senior Citizen Safety Programs designed to meet the needs of Keiser's older residents. These efforts include volunteer training, wellness checks, fraud prevention education, emergency ID cards, and the development of a senior safety database to ensure faster, more informed response during emergencies.

Finally, the grant provides advanced training opportunities for our officers. By covering travel, lodging, meals, registration fees, and related expenses, this investment ensures that Keiser's officers receive the latest training and skill development needed to continue protecting and serving our community at the highest level.

Through these combined initiatives, Keiser continues its commitment to community-based policing—working together with our residents to create a safer, stronger, and more engaged community for all.



Looking Back at History: December Through the Years

City of Keiser Upgrading Water Billing Software

The City of Keiser is pleased to announce an upcoming upgrade to our Water Billing Software that will offer residents more convenience, flexibility, and control than ever before. This upgrade will not only enhance how the City manages billing internally but will also make it easier for customers to access and manage their accounts at any time. After the December 1, 2025 billing cycle is completed, we will provide RVS with updated customer data so they can migrate the information into the new system and begin the debugging process well in advance.

A key feature of the new system is the Online Customer Portal, which will allow residents to securely log in to view account details, check detailed billing and payment history, and opt for Paperless Billing. Customers can also choose to receive email and text alerts reminding them of upcoming bills, payments, or account activity—helping everyone stay informed and up to date.

In addition to the online tools, the new system introduces even more ways to pay. Customers will be able to call a toll-free 800 number 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to pay their bill over the phone, providing a fast and secure option for those who prefer speaking with

an automated system. Another exciting feature is Text 2 Pay, allowing residents to make payments directly from their mobile devices simply by responding to a text message. These options are designed to make paying your bill quick, easy, and accessible from anywhere.

The system also supports multiple payment options, including automatic bank drafts and credit or debit card payments—and even better, the new processing fees for card payments will be lower than current rates, saving customers money each month.

This upgrade reflects the City's continued commitment to modernizing services and providing residents with convenient, secure, and cost-effective ways to manage their utilities. Once our discussions with the new vendor are complete, we will announce the official conversion date and share detailed instructions for accessing the new system. We are targeting 1/1/2026 for the new system to be live to all citizens.

The City of Keiser is proud to take another step forward in improving how we serve our residents—making it easier than ever to stay connected, make payments, and manage your account anytime, anywhere.

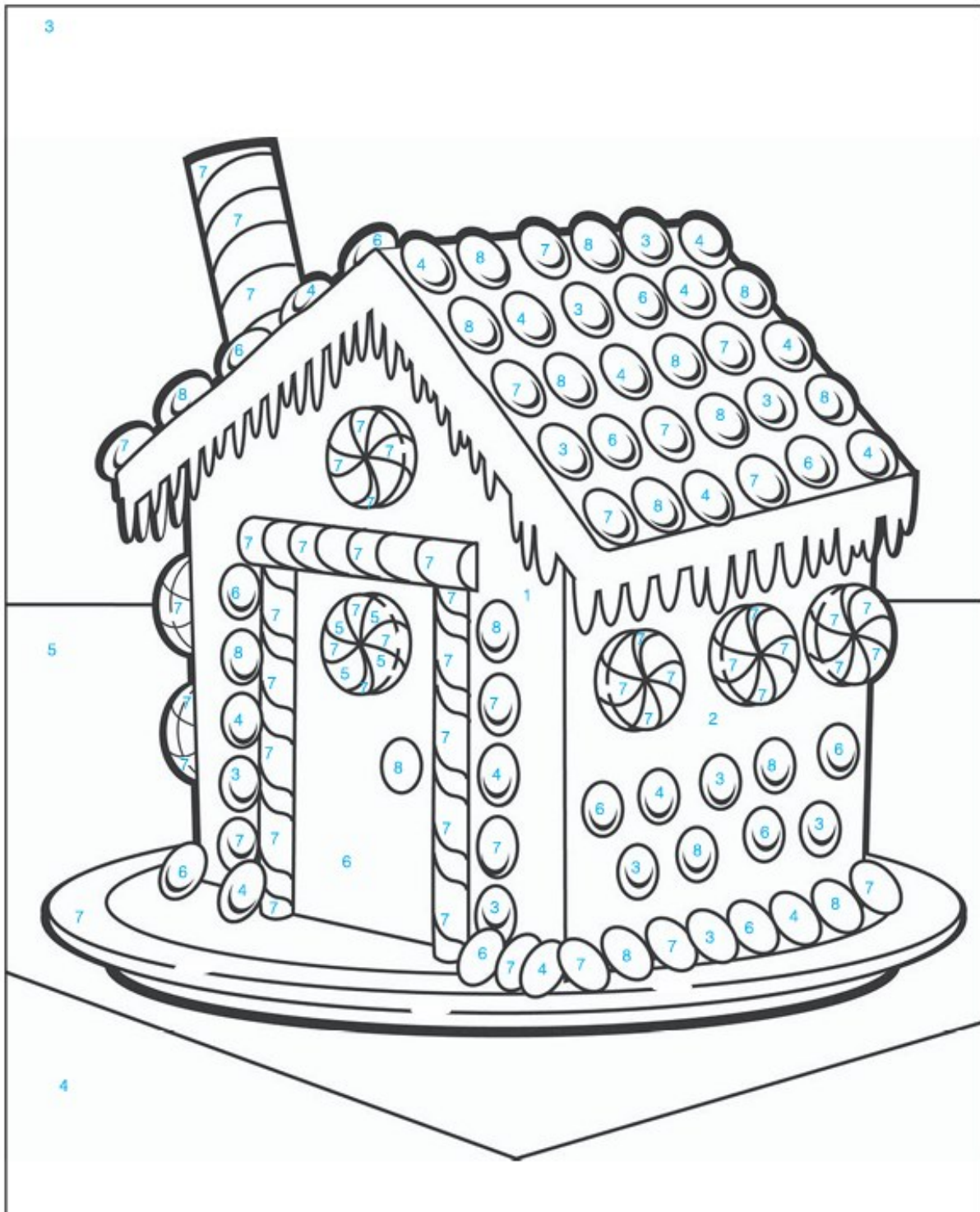
